Painting	Movement	Explanation
Thomas Eakins' <u>The Biglin Brothers</u> <u>Racing</u>	Realist	Eakin's composition gives the feeling of having captured a moment- like a snap shot- rather than an idealized image of non- specific rowers.
John-Baptiste-Camille Corot's <u>The Eel</u> <u>Gatherers</u>	Romantic	The loose brushwork and the dramatic, swirling composition. In addition, the human figures seem to melt into the landscape, connecting man with the natural world.
Andre Derain's <u>Houses of Parliament</u> <u>at Night</u>	Impressionist	The dappled color and the palette are typical of works by the Impressionists.
Thomas Cole's <u>The Voyage of Life:</u> <u>Youth</u>	Romantic	The subject matter and the idealized and dramatic visual telling of this allegorical topic, in addition to the brushwork and style of painting.
Edgar Degas' <u>The Dance Class</u>	Impressionist	The layering of color and the staccato rhythms of the brushwork, in addition to the subject matter.
Gustave Courbet's <u>Le Bretonnerie in</u> the Department of Indre	Realist	The relatively smooth brushwork and the direct, steady portrayal of the landscape.
Winslow Homer's <u>Breezing Up a Fair</u> <u>Wind</u>	Realist	Like the Eakins this image seems to be capturing a moment in time in a way that brings the viewer into the immediacy of the scene.
John Constable's <u>The White Horse</u>	Romantic	Both the landscape and the horse of the title are idealized in this composition and in the way Constable has lit the scene.
Mary Cassatt's <u>Little Girl in a Blue</u> <u>Armchair</u>	Impressionist	The loose brushwork that captures the posture and attitude of the little girl while creating her world in cursory strokes give this away as an Impressionist work.
